

Proposed Slate of Class I (Election Year: 2019, Term: 2019-2021) **Arms Control Association Board of Directors Candidates**

The Board of Directors of the Arms Control Association has proposed the following candidates for election. To vote in favor, even if you are unable to attend the meeting, please sign and return your ballot on the registration form by **March 31, 2019**. (*Asterisk denotes new Board Member.*)

PHILIP COYLE: *Former Associate Director for National Security and International Affairs, White House Office of Science and Technology Policy*

Philip Coyle was associate director for national security and international affairs at the White House Office of Science and Technology Policy under President Barack Obama. During the George W. Bush administration he served on the Defense Base Realignment and Closure Commission. As the assistant secretary of defense and director of Operational Test and Evaluation, Coyle was responsible for overseeing the test and evaluation of over 200 major defense acquisition systems. Prior to his time at the Pentagon, Coyle was associate director of the Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory in Livermore, California where he served in several capacities from 1959 to 1979, and again from 1981 to 1993. During the Carter Administration, Coyle served as principal deputy assistant secretary for defense programs at the Energy Department. He currently is a senior science fellow at the Center for Arms Control and Nonproliferation.

DEBORAH GORDON: *Executive Director, Preventative Defense Project, Stanford University*

Deborah Gordon is the executive director of the Preventive Defense Project at Stanford University, directed by former Secretary of Defense William J. Perry. Gordon serves on the Board of Directors of the Arms Control Association, Technology for Global Security, and the Fort Ross Conservancy. She currently serves on the Woodside Town Council as director, the City/County Association of Governments of San Mateo County as chair, the San Mateo County Legislative Committee as chair, and on the San Mateo County Resource Management and Climate Protection Task Force as chair. She is the former mayor of Woodside, California. Gordon has over 30 years of experience in algorithm design, signal processing, network design, and network security and holds several U.S. and Canadian patents for her work in medical instrumentation.

ANGELA KANE*: *Former United Nations High Representative for Disarmament Affairs*

Angela Kane is the former United Nations High Representative for Disarmament Affairs. She provided strategy, vision and thought leadership for the UN on its multilateral disarmament and non-proliferation agendas. She was responsible for planning, negotiating and conducting the ground-breaking investigation of alleged chemical weapons use in Syria in 2013, which resulted in Syria's destruction of its chemical stocks. Previously, Kane served as the Under-Secretary-General for Management, heading the largest and most complex UN department, with responsibility for the global financial and budgetary management of the UN (2008-2012). Kane also served as UN Assistant Secretary-General for Political Affairs, focusing on the prevention and resolution of conflicts in all regions except Africa. She also was the Assistant Secretary-General for General Assembly and Conference Management. Her field experience includes Deputy Special Representative of the Secretary-General for the United Nations Mission in Ethiopia and Eritrea (UNMEE), a special assignment to the Democratic Republic of the Congo and multi-year postings in Indonesia and Thailand. Kane now serves as a senior fellow at the Vienna Center for Disarmament and Non-Proliferation.

CATHERINE KELLEHER: *College Park Professor, University of Maryland; former Personal Representative of the Secretary of Defense in Europe*

Catherine Kelleher is a College Park professor at the University of Maryland and served as a senior fellow at the Watson Institute at Brown University. She is also professor emeritus of strategic research at the Naval War College in Newport, Rhode Island. In the Clinton Administration, Kelleher was the personal representative of the Secretary of Defense in Europe; deputy assistant secretary of defense for Russia, Ukraine, and Eurasia; and, the Secretary of Defense's representative to NATO in Brussels. During the Carter administration, Kelleher served on the National Security Council staff. Kelleher is the founding director of the Center for International Security Studies at Maryland (CISSM) and is also the founder of Women in International Security program. She is the

recipient of: the Medal for Distinguished Public Service of the Defense Department; the Director's Medal from the Defense Intelligence Agency; the Cross of Honor in Gold of the Federal Armed Forces of Germany; and the Manfred Woerner Medal by the German Ministry of Defense for her contributions to peace and security in Europe. She has served on the Deep Cuts Commission, an Arms Control Association-affiliated group involving 21 U.S., German, and Russian experts.

MARYANN CUSIMANO LOVE*: *Associate Professor of International Relations, Catholic University of America*

Maryann Cusimano Love is a tenured Associate Professor of International Relations in the Politics Department of the Catholic University of America. She is also a member of the Core Group for the Department of State's working group on Religion and Foreign Policy, charged with making recommendations to the Secretary of State and the Federal Advisory Commission on how the U.S. government can better engage with civil society and religious actors in foreign policy. Love serves as a Fellow at the Commission on International Religious Freedom, where she works with the Foreign Service Institute in developing education materials on religion and foreign policy. Love also serves on the U.S. Catholic Bishops' International Justice and Peace Committee, where she advises the bishops on international affairs; the Advisory Board of the Catholic Peacebuilding Network, a network of practitioners, academics, clergy, and laity from around the world; and, the board of Jesuit Refugee Services, an international refugee relief and advocacy group active in over 60 countries.

GREG THIELMANN: *Former Senior Professional Staffer, Senate Select Committee on Intelligence; Former Foreign Service Officer; Former Senior Fellow at the Arms Control Association*

From 2005-2009, Greg Thielmann was a senior professional staffer for the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence (SSCI). He was a foreign service officer for 25 years, last serving as director of the Strategic, Proliferation and Military Affairs Office in the Department of State's Bureau of Intelligence and Research. His foreign posts include: political-military affairs officer in Moscow, USSR and political-military affairs officer in Bonn, Germany. Thielmann also served as deputy director of the State Department's Office of German, Austrian and Swiss Affairs; special assistant to Ambassador Paul Nitze (then special adviser to the President and Secretary of State on Arms Control); and State Department advisor to the U.S. Delegation at the Geneva Intermediate-Range Nuclear Forces Treaty negotiations. For the past five years he has served on the Deep Cuts Commission, an Arms Control Association-affiliated group involving 21 U.S., German, and Russian experts.

ANDREW WEBER: *Non-resident Senior Fellow, Belfer Center, Harvard University; former Assistant Secretary of Defense for Nuclear, Chemical and Biological Defense*

Andrew Weber is a non-resident senior fellow at Harvard Kennedy School's Belfer Center. He also joined Metabiota in February 2016 as head of Global Partnerships in the Government Business Unit. Weber served 30 years in the U.S. government, most recently as the deputy coordinator for Ebola response at the State Department. He served until October 2014 as assistant secretary of defense for nuclear, chemical & biological defense programs. He played a key role in the Nunn-Lugar Cooperative Threat Reduction program, which removed weapons grade uranium from Kazakhstan and Georgia, nuclear-capable MiG-29 aircraft from Moldova, and eliminated Libyan and Syrian chemical weapons stockpiles. He created and expanded the Defense Department's Global Health Security programs in Eurasia, Africa, South and Southeast Asia, and the Middle East.

CHRISTINE WING, Treasurer of the Board: *Senior Research Fellow at the Center on International Cooperation, New York University*

Christine Wing is a consultant and a writer. She teaches courses on nuclear proliferation and on the role of NGOs in global politics at New York University's Master's Program in International Security. At NYU, Wing was a senior fellow at the Center on International Cooperation program, where her research concerned the role of multilateral institutions in reducing the threats posed by weapons of mass destruction. Earlier, she was a program officer for international peace and security at the Ford Foundation where she oversaw the foundation's funding concerning WMDs, the emerging security environment, and intrastate and regional conflict. Wing has also served as coordinator of the National Disarmament Program at the American Friends Service Committee in Philadelphia. For many years she has also been active in her communities—locally and nationally—on a range of social justice issues. Wing holds a Ph.D. in international security studies from the Woodrow Wilson School at Princeton University.
